

The Chumash Uprising Of 1824: What We Know 200 Years Later At the Museum |

Fleischmann Auditorium Jun. 3, 7:30 p.m. - 9:00 p.m.

This FREE public lecture by SBMNH Curator Emeritus of Anthropology John R. Johnson, Ph.D., is presented by the Santa Barbara County Archaeological Society.

Two hundred years ago, Native Americans at three missions, Santa Inés, La Purísima, and Santa Bárbara took up arms and fought against presidio soldiers. The Chumash Uprising of 1824 was a significant event in California Mission history that has been viewed from many different angles, both in the past and down to the present day. Dr. Johnson's presentation is based upon original research using primary records, Chumash oral traditions, translations of contemporary documents, and recollections from California's inhabitants. Spanish-Mexican New information about participants in the uprising emerge from this research, and analysis of historical trends provides insights regarding underlying causes.

Forever Stamp Honors UCLA Coach John Wooden

John Wooden's extraordinary and enduring contributions to college basketball and the athletic community worldwide were lauded during the Postal Service's dedication ceremony for the new stamp in his honor at UCLA.

Wooden, often considered the greatest coach in the history Bruins to a record-setting 10 na-

on the court was unparalleled, and he is remembered for teaching his players how to achieve excellence not only on the court but also in life. Wooden began his

career at UCLA in 1948 and retired in 1975. He helped break the color barrier in collegiate basketball as a coach and was inducted into the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame twice: in 1960, as a player for Purdue University in the 1930s, and in 1973, as a coach.

The National Collegiate Athletics Association named him College Basketball Coach of the Year six times.

In 1964, he led UCLA to a perfect 30-0 season and its first national

championship. The 1965 team won the national championship, too, becoming only the fifth ever to win two consecutive titles. The Bruins' era as a dynasty had begun. The Bruins would go on to win eight more national championships under Wooden's leadership.

UCLA enjoyed four perfect sea-American sports, led the UCLA sons and, during the 1971 through 1974 seasons, the team won an tional championships. His success unprecedented 88 consecutive

games — a record that remains unbroken.

Wooden was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the nation's highest civilian honor, in 2003 by President George W. Bush. He died in 2010 at the age

of 99.

The stamp is available at Post Office locations and usps.com. The image shows a portrait of Wooden looking intently beyond the viewer. The numbers on the two players' jerseys, 4 and 10, evoke the Bruins' four perfect seasons and the 10 national championships during Wooden's tenure.

How, one wonders, does something like this happen? How does a civilian collect \$146,000 in VA benefits for allegedly having been wounded and held a prisoner of war in Iraq when he's never even served in the military?

The story: A civilian has been charged with taking education, health and disability benefits after he claimed to be a Marine who was wounded in combat and held as a prisoner of war in Iraq. He claimed to have been wounded in an IED (improvised explosive device) attack and was then captured. He claimed he'd been awarded the Purple Heart, Prisoner of War medal and several others.

To apply for all those benefits and cash, he would have needed a DD214 as well as other paperwork. To keep from delaying the handing out of benefits and cash, the VA lets veterans use their own

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documents when they submit applications.

Sometimes people lie and turn in fake documents. Over time he turned in a pile of those fake documents, including the DD214 and certificates for his stack of alleged medals.

But that's where this criminal's story should have fallen apart. I can see accepting a veteran's initial documents to get him started on the benefits, but to let the fraud go on for five long years? Surely someone could have looked up the details to verify the Purple Heart and prisoner of war status? Did no one bother to check to see if he'd even been in the military?

Eventually the criminal greedy and applied for educational benefits on top of the cash he and payments to the university.

2 cups cantaloupe, peeled, seeded and chopped mangoes, peeled, pitted and chopped

2 Tbsp. fresh lemon juice 1/2 cup dry white wine 1/2 cup plain yogurt

2 Tbsp. confectioners ten-x sugar mint leaves

Using a blender, puree all the ingredients except for the mint leaves. Chill for at least 3 hours. When ready to serve, stir, pour into small bowls (I use ramekins), garnish with the mint leaves and serve. Serves 4 to 6.

Health-Related Travel Tips

Dear Savvy,

What tips can you offer retirees with health issues who are planning some trips? We've been looking forward to traveling again after staying home the past few years, but my husband has a heart condition and some back problems that worry me.

—Concerned Wife

Dear Concerned,

A dream vacation can turn into a real nightmare if you get ill or injured while you're away and aren't prepared. Before setting out, here are some tips to help ensure a safe and healthy trip for you and your husband.

Get prepared: Before you go, talk with your doctor about your travel itinerary and what precautions you need to take before traveling. You should also have your doctor's contact information with you when you travel, as well as a list of the medications you're taking in case you need emergency medical care while you're away.

It's also a smart idea to locate health clinics or urgent care facilities near the areas you're visiting. Your hotel can help you with this or a simple internet search can identify nearby health care services. If you're traveling abroad, the U.S. consulate or embassy in the countries you're visiting (go to

step.state.gov to enroll your trip) is a good place to get a referral. Or use the International Society of Travel Medicine's directory at ISTM.org.

If you're traveling outside the U.S., you also need to find out the health conditions of the country you're visiting and what, if any, vaccinations and/or preventative medications are recommended. See CDC.gov/travel or call 800-232-4636 to get this information.

Check your insurance: If you have private health insurance or a Medicare Advantage plan through an HMO or PPO that covers innetwork doctors only, check your plan to find out what's covered if you need medical care when traveling outside your area.

Beneficiaries that have original Medicare are covered everywhere in the U.S. But if you're traveling abroad, you won't be covered outside the U.S. and its territories except in rare circumstances, although some Medicare Advantage plans and some Medigap supplemental policies do provide limited coverage. Most private health plans don't pay health care costs outside the U.S. either.

Many retirees traveling abroad choose to purchase travel insurance with medical coverage, which may cover expenses if you cancel the trip, need to be treated while traveling or need to be evacuated for medical care. Make sure the policy will also cover your preexisting medical conditions. To shop and compare policies, please visit TravelInsurance.com, InsureMy-Trip.com orSquareMouth.com.

Organize your medications: Make sure you have a sufficient supply of medications to last the entire trip. If traveling by air, you need to pack your medicine in your carry-on bag, so if your checked luggage gets lost or misdirected you won't be without. It's best to keep your medications in their original containers to get through airport security without delays. It's also a good idea to bring along a note from your doctor that explains why you take these medications, especially if syringes or other medical supplies are involved.

For airport security requirements, please visit TSA.gov - click on "Disabilities and Medical Conditions". You can also call TSA Cares at 855-787-2227 prior to traveling with questions about screening policies and what to expect at the security checkpoint.

Maximize technology: Keep a list of your medications and other important health and medical information handy on your smartphone so you can easily access and share it with emergency health care providers when you're traveling. Some good apps that can help with this are Backpack Health (Backpack-Health.com) and Capzule (Capzule.com).

Walking Is Beneficial

We need to move more. They call it an inactive lifestyle when we get very little exercise and do a lot of sitting. Whether we're sitting in front of a computer, or watching TV, or even riding in a car for long hours, sitting is sitting, and too much of it isn't good for us.

Here are just a few medical problems that can come from too much sitting around: diabetes, high blood pressure and osteoporosis. And stroke and high cholesterol and the list goes on.

Are you ready to get moving yet? Walking can be one of the most beneficial forms of exercise, and the benefits can be life changing: stronger bones and muscles, lower blood sugar, improved quality of sleep and much more.

Ask your doctor how many steps you need to take each day and how many minutes of exercise you need per week because — believe it or not — there is a risk of too much exercise. The often-quoted 150 minutes of exercise per week or 10,000 steps per day might not apply to you.

If you doctor adheres to the standard advice (thousands of steps per day), fear not. The internet is loaded with suggestions and videos aimed at seniors, and it's a good place to start for walking ideas.

If you live in a building with an elevator, stop it one floor below where you normally get off. Walk up the rest of the way.

If you have a big box store near you, use the aisles as your personal track, or make a circuit of the store once or twice.

Leave your car at the other end of a parking lot.

If you're just now beginning a walking program, start small but set attainable goals. And as always, when you exercise, stay hydrated!

PopStroke Mini Golf's 14th location in five states opened recently on Las Vegas Blvd. across the Strip from Town Square just south of Mandalay Bay. The two 18-hole mini-golf courses each take 45-60 minutes to complete, depending on your number of players. The putter and TaylorMade golf balls are included in the day-pass price: \$24 kids 3-12, \$32 seniors, \$40 adults; hours are 9 a.m. to 11 p.m. daily. The full-service restaurant opens at 11 a.m. and serves a breakfast burrito (\$8), tenders (\$12), wings (\$15), burgers, sandwiches, and wraps (\$14-\$16), tacos (\$16-\$18), and salads (\$16-\$21). There's also an ice cream parlor, playground, Jumbotrons, and more.


FREE Astronomy Talk: Many MoonsAt the Museum | Fleischmann Auditorium Jun. 14, 7:30 p.m. - 9:00 p.m.

Ride along on a whirlwind tour of some of the solar system's most interesting residents: moons! NASA has counted 760 moons in our solar system to date, all telling a tale of cosmic origins. Each one of these natural satellites is as unique as a fingerprint. They can be seen all over: from orbiting Earth, in the heart of the asteroid belt, to the very edges of our solar system. Astronomy Programs Manager John Winckowski will unveil and dive into mysterious moons with fascinating stories and facts during a free in-person talk presented by the Santa Barbara Astronomical Unit. This talk reprises Wincowski's popular Science Pub presentation on the same subject.

Isolated on a small patch of land between the inhospitable mountains and the unfathomable depths of the ocean, and never satisfied with just one planet to live on, Winckowski is the Museum's resident astronomer and moon enthusiast. He has always wanted to travel to the stars and explore alien worlds. Until that's feasible, he'll do the next best thing: study neighboring worlds and their many moons. His passion for astronomy goes back to his youth, but his professional career started when he earned his bachelor's in physics with a concentration in astrophysics from the University of Toledo. In 2018, he began working as a planetarium coordinator in Northern Michigan, and then moved to Santa Barbara in 2023 to begin his job here.

Gaming News

Author Talk

In 1962, at age thirty, Edward O. Thorp published Beat the Dealer, the book that launched tens of thousands of card-counting careers. It was also four years after he earned his PhD in mathematics from UCLA, then got a job at MIT that allowed him to use the most powerful computer of the day to establish the probabilities of winning at blackjack. While he was a professor of mathematics at New Mexico State and UC Irvine, he used his familiarity with probability and statistics to discover and exploit pricing anomalies in securities markets, set up his first hedge fund, and was on his way to making a fortune. Today, Thorp is 91 and lives in Laguna Beach and in a rare interview on Bloomberg. com, he "shares what he's learned about exercise, diet, and managing risk in all areas of life." The article is well worth the read.

Casino Seeks To Launch iGaming

After the 2022 legalization of online sports betting in Arkansas had already resulted in significant revenue figures, Saracen Casino Resort in Pine Bluff is seeking regulatory approval to launch an iGaming app and make additional online gambling operations available in the state. The move seeking legalization of online casino games may represent another milestone for the gambling industry in Arkansas and further boost online gambling revenues.

Banned For Life

The National Basketball Association has banned 24-year-old Toronto Raptors' center Jontay Porter after an investigation determined that he gambled on NBA games, which included betting on the Raptors to lose, disclosed confidential information to sports bettors, and influenced the outcome of a player proposition on himself. The investigation was launched after unnamed "licensed sports betting operators and an organization that monitors legal betting markets" flagged "unusual gambling patterns" based on Porter's play, or lack thereof, in a game on March 20 against the Sacramento Kings. NBA Commissioner Adam Silver called Porter's actions "a cardinal sin" and banned him from the game for life.

Brightline Breaks Ground

At press time, Secretary of the U.S. Department of Transportation Pete Buttigieg, among a number of other federal, state, and local dignitaries and the founder and chairman of Brightline were set to attend the groundbreaking at the site of the train station, just off Las Vegas Blvd. and Warm Springs. Construction is expected to take four years, and the trip is expected to take two hours on trains traveling at up to 200 mph.

Whether it is at Bingo or a favorite restaurant or at church, as we grow older month by month, year by year, we see more and more empty chairs. And, folks, it isn't because our friends have "passed away"—they died. When I first started doing radio news in 1965 people died. No one passed away back then. I even had a journalism professor at Indiana University who would go into a rage if any student wrote that a person had passed away, followed by a simple speech: "They don't pass away, go to their great reward, tear the veil, breathe their last breath, buy the farm, go to a better place, shuffle off this mortal coil, cash in their chips, cross the River Styx.....they simply DIE." He would always add, "As journalists, it is not our job to comfort...we are here to report, and people simply die."

Obviously, I have never forgotten his instructions. I still cringe when my local radio station says that someone has passed away; I have given the manager clear instructions that when I die, his listeners should be told that I died. I didn't pass away. Ye Gods, I hate

that phrase.

OK, lecture over. I bring all this up because I want to pay tribute to a former roommate of mine in Las Vegas. His name was Michael. He not only was a constant companion of mine at Bingo, he was the one who stood by me in the months after my open-heart surgery. In many ways, he saved my life.

We were seen together so often that many people thought we were boyfriends...an easy assumption since both of us were gay—but we were simply roommates.

Six months after my surgery I was finally on the mend. Michael and I began a performance group and recreated Old Time Radio shows for nursing homes. It was great fun, then, one day Michael died.

Simple as that. He died. It was then that I moved back to my hometown in Indiana and, last month, into a nine-story senior high-rise apartment building. My

window (on the 8th floor) has a wonderful view of my hometown. I can even see the old school where I first played Bingo in 1957.

The other day I took some photos from my window. I thought: "Ah, I ought to send some of these to Michael...nope...can't do that."

But I have no doubt that Michael has been watching me-and he has seen all of it. There are so many good friends whose chairs are now empty at Bingo. Take the next thirty seconds to quietly think about them...and what they brought into our lives. The thirty seconds starts NOW.

O: I have several copperware casseroles that have worn spots and probably need to be re-tinned. How can I find a place to get this done without needing to ship them? Is it dangerous to use these pieces as they are?

A: Don't use the casseroles if the tin lining is worn off. Direct contact with tomatoes or other acidic food can cause small amounts of copper to leach into the food. If you live near a big city, you might find a local metal repair shop that does re-tinning. If there is no one near you, you can find other places online. The company that made the copperware, or a store near you that sells similar pieces, might be able to recommend someone who does re-tinning. If you can't get the pieces re-tinned, just use them as display items.

TIP: Set heavy garden urns or statues on a foundation, usually a cement block set in the ground.
